Anne E Kelly, District Attorney for the Twelfth Judicial District, of the State of Colorado, in the name and by the authority of the People of the State of Colorado, informs the court of the following offenses committed, or triable, in the County of Alamosa:

COUNT 1-TAMPERING WITH A WITNESS OR VICTIM (F4)

On or about May 4, 2026, Leonel Sarmiento unlawfully, feloniously, and intentionally attempted, without bribery or threats, to induce Ashley Sarmiento, a witness, a victim, or a person the defendant believed would be called to testify as a witness or victim in an official proceeding, to testify falsely or unlawfully withhold any testimony from an official proceeding to which she was to be legally summoned, in violation of section 18-8-707, C.R.S.

COUNT 2-FIRST DEGREE OFFICIAL MISCONDUCT (M1)

On or about May 4, 2026, Leonel Sarmiento, a public servant, with intent to obtain a benefit for himself or any person, unlawfully and knowingly committed an act relating to his office but constituting an unauthorized exercise of his official function in violation of section 18-8-404, C.R.S.

All offenses against the peace and dignity of the people of the State of Colorado.

AFFIDAVIT OF PROBABLE CAUSE FOR ARREST WARRANT

I, **Chief Investigator Michael Martinez**, of lawful age and being first sworn upon oath, state that I have probable cause for believing that:

Leonel Sarmiento, DOB: 12/04/1991

did commit the crime(s) of:

18-8-707(1)(c)	Tampering with a Witness of Victim	F4
18-6-800.3	Domestic Violence	SE
18-8-404(1)(a)(c)	First Degree Official Misconduct	M1

Within Alamosa County, Colorado, and as grounds therefore, state as follows:

That this Affiant is a Peace Officer with the **12th Judicial District Attorney's Office**, and that the following information was obtained by me personally and the official records of **THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE**.

Your Affiant, Michael Martinez, is a certified peace officer with the 12th Judicial District Attorney's Office. Where not otherwise indicated, Your Affiant obtained the following information through personal observation, talking to other peace officers, talking to witnesses, and/or reading the reports of other peace officers.

Introduction

In court case number C0022025M430, Leonel Sarmiento (DOB: 12/04/1991) was arrested and charged with harassment and domestic violence by the Alamosa County Sheriff's Office. Sarmiento is employed as an officer with the Alamosa Police Department; however, the charges stem from an off-duty incident involving his former wife on September 16, 2025. The case remains pending and is currently being prosecuted by the 12th Judicial District Attorney's Office.

Victim Tampering

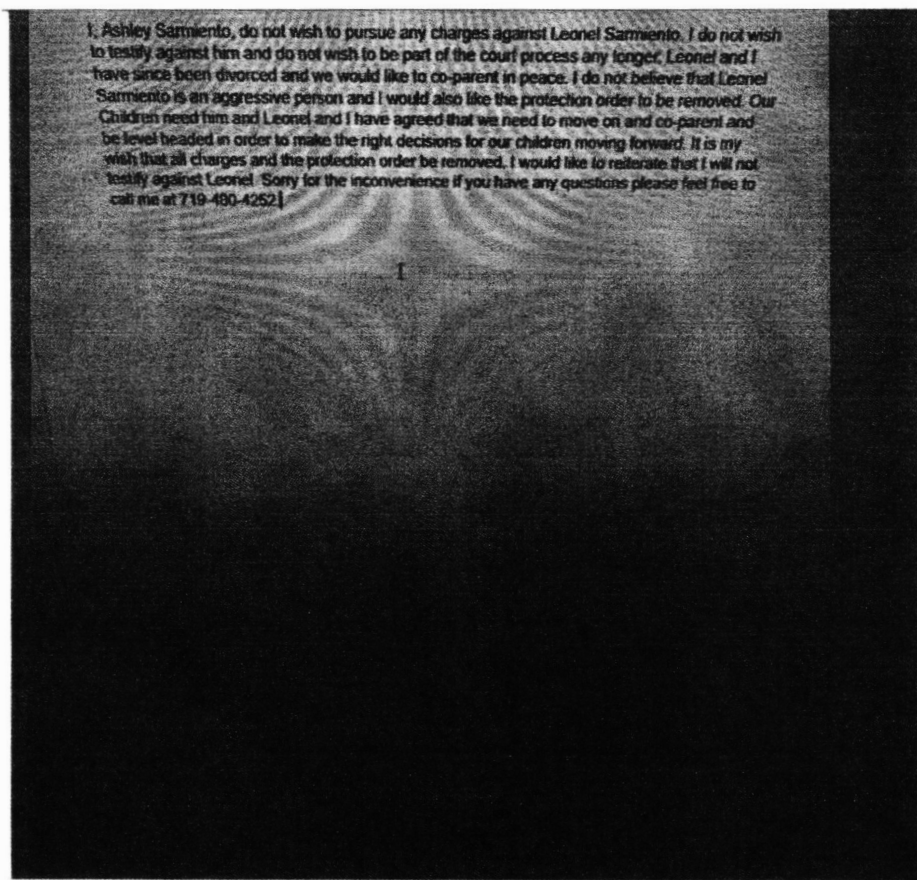
On May 4, 2026, the victim and former spouse of Sarmiento (Ashley Sarmiento) reported to a Victim Advocate within our office that Sarmiento had been attempting to influence her to submit a letter to our office requesting dismissal of the pending criminal case. Due to the nature of these allegations, the matter was assigned to Your Affiant for further investigation into potential victim

tampering. This investigation is being treated as a separate criminal matter, with the original domestic violence case serving as an underlying basis.

On May 7, 2026, I conducted an interview with Ashley. During that interview, she provided a typed letter addressed to District Attorney Anne Kelly, Deputy District Attorney Patrick Deng, "or whom it may concern." The letter begins with the statement: "I, Ashley Sarmiento, do not wish to pursue any charges against Leonel Sarmiento," and proceeds to outline reasons why she no longer wishes to testify.

Ashley disclosed that the letter was not authored by her, but instead was written by Sarmiento himself as part of his efforts to persuade her to request dismissal of the case. She further reported that Sarmiento used various forms of coercion, including peripheral bribes, emotional manipulation involving their children, and statements indicating suicidal ideation.

Additionally, Ashley provided our office with text message communications supporting these allegations. In one message on April 21, 2026, Sarmiento sent a photograph showing the letter while he was actively drafting it on a computer. Below are a picture of the letter and the computer used to type it, depicted in said photo:



Ashley stated that Sarmiento sent these texts while on duty and said that the computer used to draft the letter was a department issued or department accessible work computer. Ashley also

stated that she delayed reporting the incident because she feared she could face consequences for initially agreeing to Sarmiento's tactics. She explained that she went along with his plan because he had manipulated her into believing it was a good idea and that it would allow her to avoid further involvement with law enforcement and the court process, which is something she said he knew would appeal to her. Ashley stated that it was not until she later discussed the matter with her therapist that she recognized his actions as manipulative and likely a violation of the law.

Follow-up with City Officials

On May 7, 2026, I contacted Alamosa Chief of Police George Dingfelder regarding the allegations involving Sarmiento. Specifically, I advised Chief Dingfelder of my concern that Sarmiento may have used a department owned computer to draft the letter in question. Given that Sarmiento would not have a reasonable expectation of privacy in department owned equipment used in the course of his employment as a peace officer, I requested administrative assistance in retrieving the letter itself, along with any related evidence located on computers accessed by Sarmiento. This information was requested because it is believed to constitute material evidence in a subsequent prosecution involving the allegations of victim tampering.

Chief Dingfelder then placed me in contact with Information Technology Director Brandon Gallegos for further assistance. On May 11, 2026, I spoke with Gallegos who advised that, based on the information available to him, he could confirm that the letter had been drafted on a department computer used by Sarmiento. Gallegos said that the letter appeared to have been created and saved within Sarmiento's Google Drive account, but that the contents were later deleted and moved to the trash folder. Gallegos told me that he would continue efforts to recover all edited and revised versions of the document.

I confirmed with Gallegos that he was comfortable affirming that the letter had been typed on a department computer. Gallegos stated that he was and further added that, based on the photograph Ashley provided, it was apparent the computer depicted was the workstation normally used by Sarmiento. Specifically, Gallegos noted that the distinct hole cut out on the desk of the computer matched Sarmiento's normal workstation. Additionally, Gallegos stated that the photograph displayed the Alamosa Police Department Report Management System open as a tab on the computer screen, which is accessible only through department issued computers utilized by the Alamosa Police Department.

I later spoke again with Chief Dingfelder, who told me that he considered Sarmiento's actions to constitute an unauthorized use of his official function and to be in violation of multiple department policies, in addition to statute.

Conclusion

Based on the facts and information described, Your Affiant believes probable cause exists to establish that Leonel Sarmiento committed the offense of Tampering with a Witness or Victim in violation of C.R.S. 18-8-707(1)(c). The investigation supports that Sarmiento knowingly attempted to induce Ashley Sarmiento to absent herself from, or otherwise avoid appearing or testifying at any official proceeding in which she may have been legally summoned, by withholding testimony as a victim. The investigation established that Ashley Sarmiento was the

victim in pending criminal case number C0022025M430, which was actively being prosecuted by this office. Ashley reported that Sarmiento authored a letter for her to submit to the District Attorney requesting dismissal of the case and stating that she no longer wished to pursue charges or testify. Ashley further stated that Sarmiento repeatedly pressured and manipulated her into submitting the letter through emotional coercion, discussions involving their children, peripheral bribes, and statements suggesting suicidal ideation. Text message evidence corroborates Ashley's account and includes photographs sent by Sarmiento while he was actively drafting the letter. These actions demonstrate a knowing attempt to influence victim to withdraw cooperation and avoid participation in the pending criminal prosecution.

Your Affiant also believes probable cause exists to apply a domestic violence sentence enhancer, C.R.S. 18-6-800.3. The conduct was directed toward Ashley Sarmiento, Sarmiento's former spouse and the victim in the original domestic violence case. The evidence shows that Sarmiento's actions were in an attempt to coerce or manipulate his former intimate partner.


Additionally, Your Affiant believes probable cause exists to establish that Sarmiento committed the offense of First Degree Official Misconduct, in violation of C.R.S. 18-8-404(1)(a)(c). This is because Sarmiento, with intent to obtain a benefit (no longer being prosecuted), knowingly committed an act relating to his office constituting an unauthorized exercise of his official function. The investigation revealed that Sarmiento used department issued equipment, while employed as a peace officer with the City of Alamosa, to draft a letter intended to influence a victim in a pending criminal case in which he was the defendant. Chief Dingfelder states that he considers Sarmiento's conduct to be an unauthorized use of his official function and in violation of departmental policies.

Your Affiant believes probable cause exists to assert that the offense(s) of:

Probable Cause for Arrest:

On September 16, 2025, at approximately 0848 hours, I, Deputy Shelly Rodman, arrived at 1885 Ross Avenue in the County of Alamosa, State of Colorado, for a report of possible domestic violence.

I investigated this case involving Leonel Sarmiento and Ashley Sarmiento, who were husband and wife since 2011.

I interviewed the victim in this case, Ashley. Ashley stated she found a letter in Leonel's truck, and Leonel didn't want her to see the letter so he tried to take the letter from her. Ashley stated Leonel grabbed her out of the truck, pushed her to the ground, and they wrestled over the letter.

I interviewed the arrestee in this case, Leonel. Leonel stated Ashley found the letter, and he attempted to take the letter from her and she tried to jump out of the truck to get away and slipped and fell to the ground.

I interviewed a witness who stated she heard yelling and saw Ashley and Leonel tumbling around on the ground.

I discovered there was video footage of the incident. The video footage showed Mr. Sarmiento's truck pulling up to Mrs. Sarmiento's residence. Mr. Sarmiento exited the truck, walked to the passenger side, got his water jug,

walked back to the driver's side rear door, and was standing outside of the truck with the door open. Mrs. Sarmiento had the letter in her hand, Mr. Sarmiento saw the letter in Mrs. Sarmiento's hand and jumped into the cab. Mrs. Sarmiento tried to rush out of the truck and slipped out of the truck and fell on the ground. Mr. Sarmiento climbed through the cab and out of the passenger door after Mrs. Sarmiento. He was trying to grab the letter and ended up on top of Mrs. Sarmiento and was restraining her to get the letter, but Mrs. Sarmiento did not let go of the letter. Mrs. Sarmiento was kneeling on the ground, while Mr. Sarmiento was standing over her with his arms wrapped around her. Mr. Sarmiento got up and started walking away, while Mrs. Sarmiento followed him around the driveway until Mr. Sarmiento left.

After my investigation and viewing of the video footage, I believe there is probable cause for the arrest of Leonel Sarmiento for the charges of Harassment (C.R.S. 18-9-111) and Domestic Violence (C.R.S. 18-6-800.3).

On September 16, 2025, at approximately 0848 hours, I, Deputy Shelly Rodman, arrived at 1885 Ross Avenue in the County of Alamosa, State of Colorado, for a report of possible domestic violence.

Dispatch stated the suspect was an Alamosa Police officer who pushed his wife to the ground. Due to the suspect being an employee with the Alamosa Police Department, I investigated the incident. I contacted the victim, later identified as Ashley Sarmiento. She told me that her husband, Leonel "Leo" Sarmiento, with whom she was separated, had taken off walking northbound on Ross Avenue. Mrs. Sarmiento informed me she had found a letter from another woman in Mr. Sarmiento's truck, which she still had in her hand. She stated Mr. Sarmiento attempted to take the letter from her, he pushed her down.

they "wrestled" over the letter, and then he left. I told her I would attempt to find him and I would return to speak further with her.

A neighbor at a couple of houses to the north by the name of Julia Lianares stated she saw some of the altercation, and she stated she saw Mr. Sarmiento walking north on Ross Avenue. I told Mrs. Lianares I would return to speak further with her.

I searched the area for Mr. Sarmiento. I was informed by other officers that he informed them he was at the north end of Cole Park. I arrived at Cole Park to see Mr. Sarmiento sitting on a bench. I addressed Mr. Sarmiento and told him he was detained, and put him in handcuffs and double locked them for safety purposes. I read Mr. Sarmiento his Miranda Rights and asked him if he understood his rights, and he said yes. I asked Mr. Sarmiento who Mrs. Sarmiento was to him. He stated Mrs. Sarmiento was his wife and they had been married since 2011, but they had been separated for the past couple of months, and he had been living in a different neighboring city.

I asked Mr. Sarmiento what had happened that morning. He informed that he had his children and they needed to go to school, so he stopped at Mrs. Sarmiento's house, so they could get their backpacks. While he was there, Mrs. Sarmiento stated she wanted to talk more about their divorce, and Mr. Sarmiento didn't want to talk about it, but told Mrs. Sarmiento he would meet her at the courthouse. Mrs. Sarmiento then jumped into Mr. Sarmiento's truck. They didn't want to argue in front of the kids, so they dropped the kids off at school together.

Afterwards, Mr. Sarmiento proceeded to take Mrs. Sarmiento home around 0800 hours and told her he didn't want her in his truck. When they arrived, Mrs. Sarmiento began going through Mr. Sarmiento's belongings in the truck. She opened the glove box, and she found a letter. Mr. Sarmiento saw the letter in Mrs. Sarmiento's hands and tried to grab the letter from her, but Mrs. Sarmiento held on to the letter and jumped out of the truck and slipped and fell down. Mr. Sarmiento stated that Mrs. Sarmiento looked at the letter and started calling him names and accusing him of the letter being from another woman. Mr. Sarmiento stated he grabbed his jacket and his backpack out of his truck and started walking away, but then Mrs. Sarmiento started taking everything out of his truck and throwing it on the ground. He stated she also threw his coffee at him, and it went on his jacket. He stated he walked away and walked to a gas station, where he called someone for a ride, and that's how he ended up at Cole Park. He stated nobody else was at Mrs. Sarmiento's residence when the incident occurred.

Deputy Sean Garcia assisted me in keeping Mr. Sarmiento detained by transporting him and waiting with him at the Alamosa Sheriff's Office, while I continued my investigation.

I returned to Mrs. Sarmiento's and spoke further with her. Mrs. Sarmiento stated Mr. Sarmiento moved out approximately two months prior. She had been asking Mr. Sarmiento about getting a divorce, and he was avoiding the subject. She then confirmed that when Mr. Sarmiento brought the kids that morning to get their backpacks, she jumped in Mr. Sarmiento's truck and they took the kids to school. Mrs. Sarmiento stated that when they returned around 0800 hours, she found the letter in the glove box, and Mr. Sarmiento stated the letter was none of her business and grabbed her out of the truck, stepped on top of her foot, got her to the ground, and was wrestling with her over the letter. Mrs. Sarmiento stated she held

onto the letter, and she still had it, and I saw it in her hand. She also stated her vape pen was broken during the altercation. Mrs. Sarmiento stated the truck was registered to Mr. Sarmiento. Mrs. Sarmiento stated that she and Mr. Sarmiento had been separated since June. Mrs. Sarmiento also stated she had texted the neighbor, Mrs. Lianares, telling her she needed help before the incident became physical. Mrs. Sarmiento also stated she had outdoor video cameras that may have captured the incident, but she couldn't access the videos and believed Mr. Sarmiento had deleted the video footage.

I noticed Mrs. Sarmiento was limping, and she stated she had an injury to her foot and showed me the injury. It was a minor scrape on the top of her left foot. I took pictures, and they are attached to this report. I also took pictures of where the truck was, the area the altercation occurred in, the location of the glove box, and Mrs. Sarmiento's vape pen and the broken off cartridge lying in the weeds, and the pictures are attached to this report. I asked Mrs. Sarmiento if she would fill out a witness statement about the incident, and she said yes, and she reiterated everything in her written statement. I asked Mrs. Sarmiento if she wanted to speak to a Victim's Advocate. She said yes, and Victim's Advocate Jade Garbiso arrived on scene. Ms. Garbiso completed an Advisement of Victim's Rights, and a copy of the form is attached to this report.

I returned to Mrs. Lianares' residence and asked her what she had seen that morning. Mrs. Lianares stated earlier that morning, Mrs. Sarmiento had sent her a text message that said "Help". Mrs. Lianares came out of her residence and heard yelling coming from Mrs. Sarmiento's residence. Mrs. Lianares went to the fence and glanced over and saw Mr. and Mrs. Sarmiento "tumbling around" on the ground, and she didn't know what to do, so she ran into her brother's residence. I asked Mrs. Lianares if she was willing to write a written statement about what she saw, and she said yes. In her written statement, she stated she saw Mr. Sarmiento leave and Mrs. Sarmiento went to Mrs. Lianares' house, while they waited for Mrs. Sarmiento's mother to arrive.

I went to the Sheriff's Office to speak further with Mr. Sarmiento, and he stated there should be video footage of the incident, but he couldn't get the video to work on his phone. I gave Mr. Sarmiento his phone so he could attempt to get the footage, but it wouldn't load. Mr. Sarmiento stated he usually had to access the video footage by connecting the DVR to the TV. I contacted Mrs. Sarmiento and asked her if I could use the DVR to see if we could access the video footage. She agreed. After picking up the DVR, it was connected to a TV at the Sheriff's Office. I asked Mr. Sarmiento if he could assist in pulling up the footage, and he was very compliant.

The video footage showed Mr. Sarmiento's truck pulling up to Mrs. Sarmiento's residence. Mr. Sarmiento exited the truck, walked to the passenger side, got his water jug, walked back to the driver's side rear door, and was standing outside of the truck with the door open. Mrs. Sarmiento had the letter in her hand, Mr. Sarmiento saw the letter in Mrs. Sarmiento's hand and jumped into the cab, Mrs. Sarmiento tried to rush out of the truck and slipped out of the truck and fell on the ground. Mr. Sarmiento climbed through the cab and out of the passenger door after Mrs. Sarmiento. He was trying to grab the letter and ended up on top of Mrs. Sarmiento and was restraining her to get the letter, but Mrs. Sarmiento did not let go of the letter. Mrs. Sarmiento was kneeling on the ground, while Mr. Sarmiento was standing over her with his arms wrapped around her. Mr. Sarmiento got up and started walking away, while Mrs. Sarmiento followed him around the driveway until Mr. Sarmiento left. Ms. Sarmiento saw the video footage.

Mr. Sarmiento was arrested on charges of Harassment, Colorado Revised Statute 18-9-11, and the sentence enhancer of Domestic Violence, Colorado Revised Statute 18-6-800.3 and was taken to Alamosa County Detention Center for booking of the charges.

I contacted Mrs. Sarmiento via phone to return her DVR, and she told me she was at the emergency room at the hospital getting her foot examined. I believe the injury to Mrs. Sarmiento's foot was caused when she slipped out of the truck and fell to the ground attempting to keep the letter from Mr. Sarmiento. I met with her mother by the front doors and returned the DVR.

Case closed.
